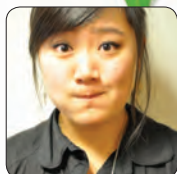

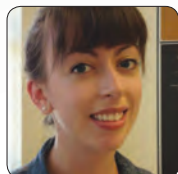

The jungle is psychology prof & renowned orangutan expert Anne Russon's living lab.

Four months out of the year, Dr. Russon and her team venture to her research camp in Kutai National Park in Indonesian Borneo to observe orangutans living in their natural habitat. Studying these great apes in their own backyards is the best way to learn how they use their intelligence to solve the natural problems in their daily lives. "No lab tests or experimental gimmicks required," she says.

This approach to psychological research provides Dr. Russon with a unique viewpoint of the apes, which can assist government agencies and other organizations to better develop conservation plans and help these endangered species to survive. "The orangutans," she says, "are dead smart; they show innovation, complex social learning, and fluid problem-solving abilities. For example, orangutans can't typically swim, but a community on one island has taught themselves how to catch fish."

Understanding orangutan communication could provide additional insights on the evolution of human communication as well; in 2010, international news station BBC reported Dr. Russon's discovery that orangutans use mime to communicate. Prior to this, it was thought that only humans were sophisticated enough to communicate through gestures.

As you might imagine, Dr. Russon's research feeds exciting, real-time discussion in her psychology classes back on campus. It has also sparked the interest of several of her students who have travelled to Borneo to do their own studies as independent projects or "field internships."

Chantalle Christos, 2nd year psychology major, had the chance to work as Dr. Russon's research mentee last year;

My research experiences with Dr. Russon gave me a glimpse of future career opportunities, which confirmed the type of job I'd like to pursue in the future. The program encouraged me to broaden my understanding of education; in itself, the experience was a learning process, a hands-on approach to my studies. The skills I acquired in the past year surpassed anything a textbook could teach; life skills, people skills, and patience.

Part in parcel of her orangutan research, Dr. Russon's activity in Borneo has also inspired students to help preserve and protect the area, a great opportunity for activism, hands-on experience, and making a difference.

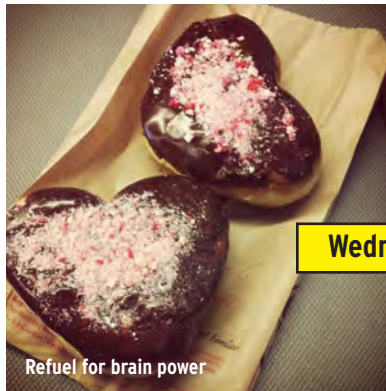

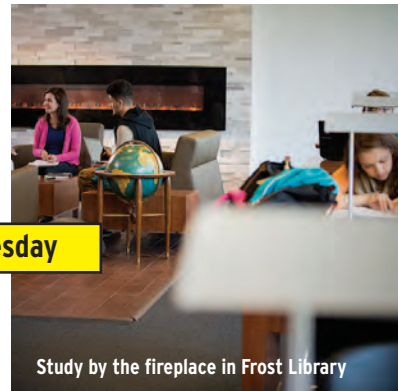

Language Abilities – Certified!

Starting with our minimum requirement, the bilingual BA, you'll have plenty of certification options to match your abilities and language goals.



MINIMUM REQUIREMENT: LEVEL 1 BILINGUAL BA

You have two options to reach this minimum requirement:

- A) French as a Second Language courses until you reach the second-year level (while all your other courses are taught in English) or
- B) One discipline course taught in French (e.g. Introduction to Psychology in French).



LEVEL 2 THE CERTIFICATE OF BILINGUALISM

You can reach this level by successfully completing a combination of three full-year discipline courses taught in French and/or French as a Second Language courses at the higher levels.



LEVEL 3 THE CERTIFICATE OF BILINGUAL EXCELLENCE

You can reach this by successfully completing three full-year courses in French and passing an exam at the end of your studies.

How it works:

As a Glendon student, you will achieve a minimum of a solid, intermediate level in your second language (English or French) to graduate (see level 1 below). When you start at Glendon, you'll be placed in a specific class that fits you best. There are several additional levels of achievement for students who arrive to us at a more advanced level or who are aiming for more. All levels of French proficiency—from true beginner to advanced—are welcome. If you choose, you can also add a third language to the mix.

LEVEL 4 THE CERTIFICATE OF TRILINGUAL EXCELLENCE

The ultimate challenge! You can achieve this distinction by successfully completing three full-year courses in each of English, French, and Spanish, and passing an exam at the end of your studies.

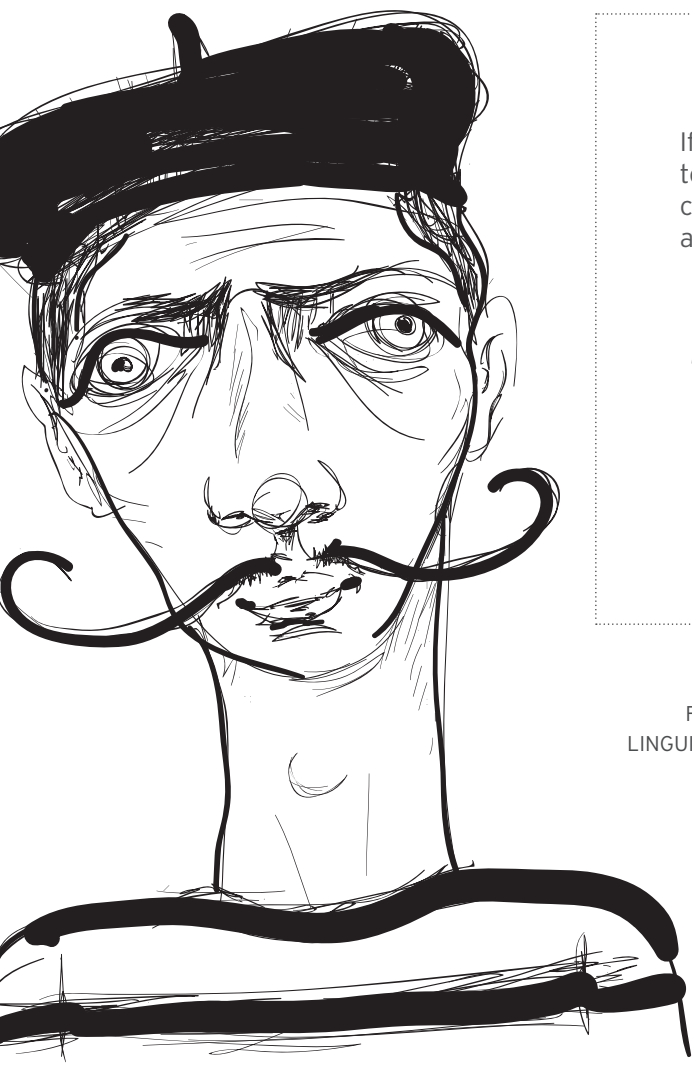

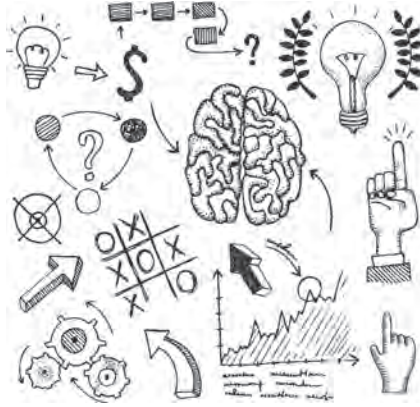

Languages make you smarter

Bilingualism won't just change your life, it will reshape your brain. Research shows that bilinguals have better neural plasticity, which means that your brain responds to new experiences by changing its structure, function, and organization of neurons. It's what makes your brain more adaptable and, as you get older, more healthy.

Bilingual brains outperform monolinguals on a number of cognitive skills otherwise unrelated to languages: problem solving, planning, mathematics, social sciences...

Bilinguals are better at multitasking. If you're surfing on your phone and drinking coffee as you read this, you know what we mean!

Bilingualism keeps you young! Because the muscles in the bilingual brain are exercised more often, they can better fend off the effects of aging on the brain.

Bilingualism can delay the onset of Alzheimer's for up to 5 years.

WANT TO REAP THESE BENEFITS? You need to use your two languages regularly!

IT'S NEVER TOO LATE TO START. While research shows that the longer someone speaks 2+ languages the greater the cognitive effects, there are benefits even when an additional language is learned at later ages.

If you love to travel, languages can make things a whole lot easier. French, in particular, is one of the most portable languages in the world since it's spoken on five continents.

Languages also help you connect to and understand people from other cultures in a much more meaningful way.

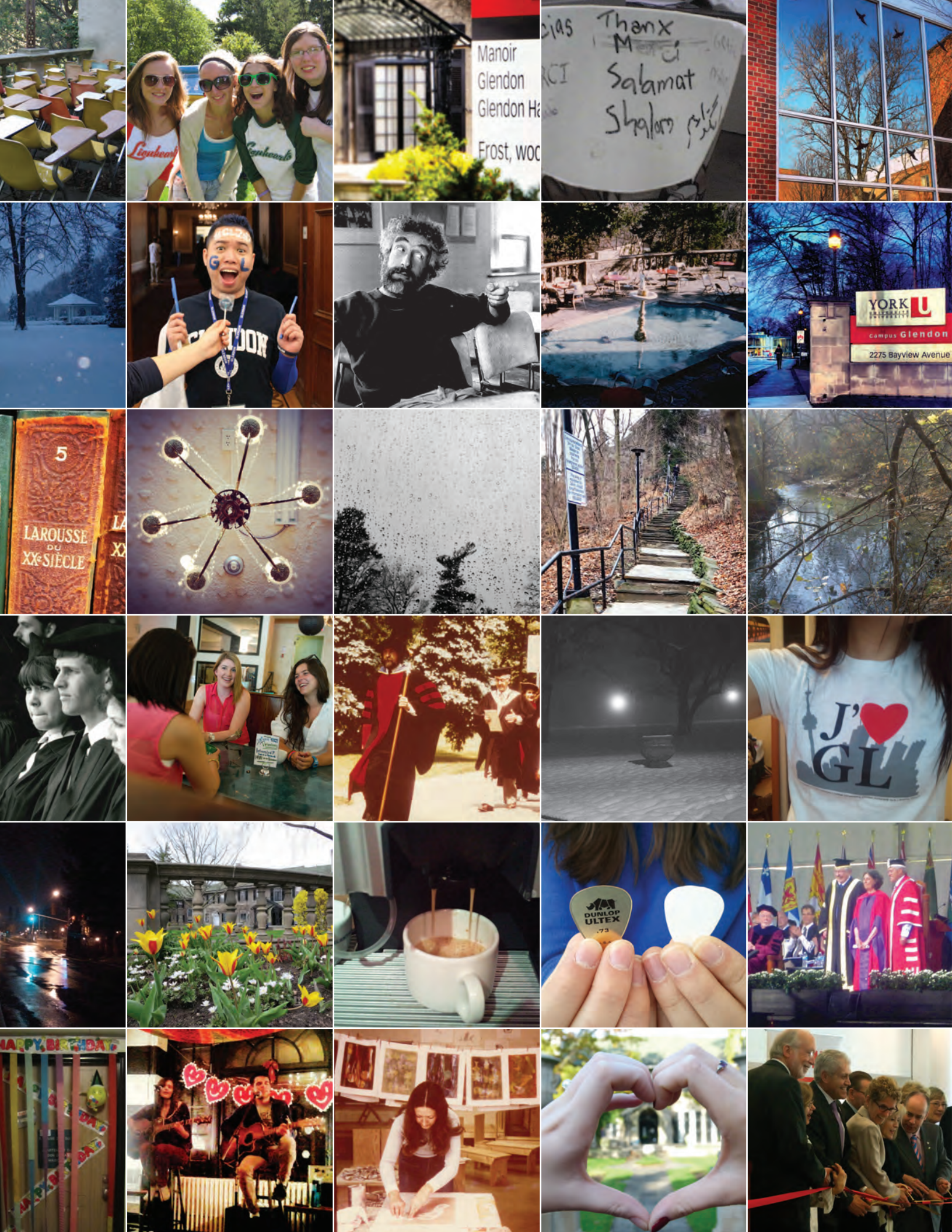

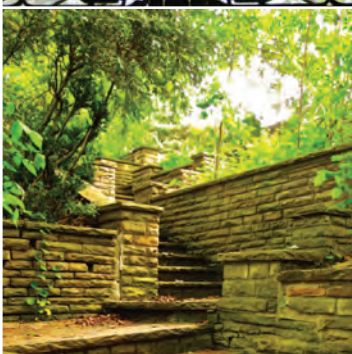

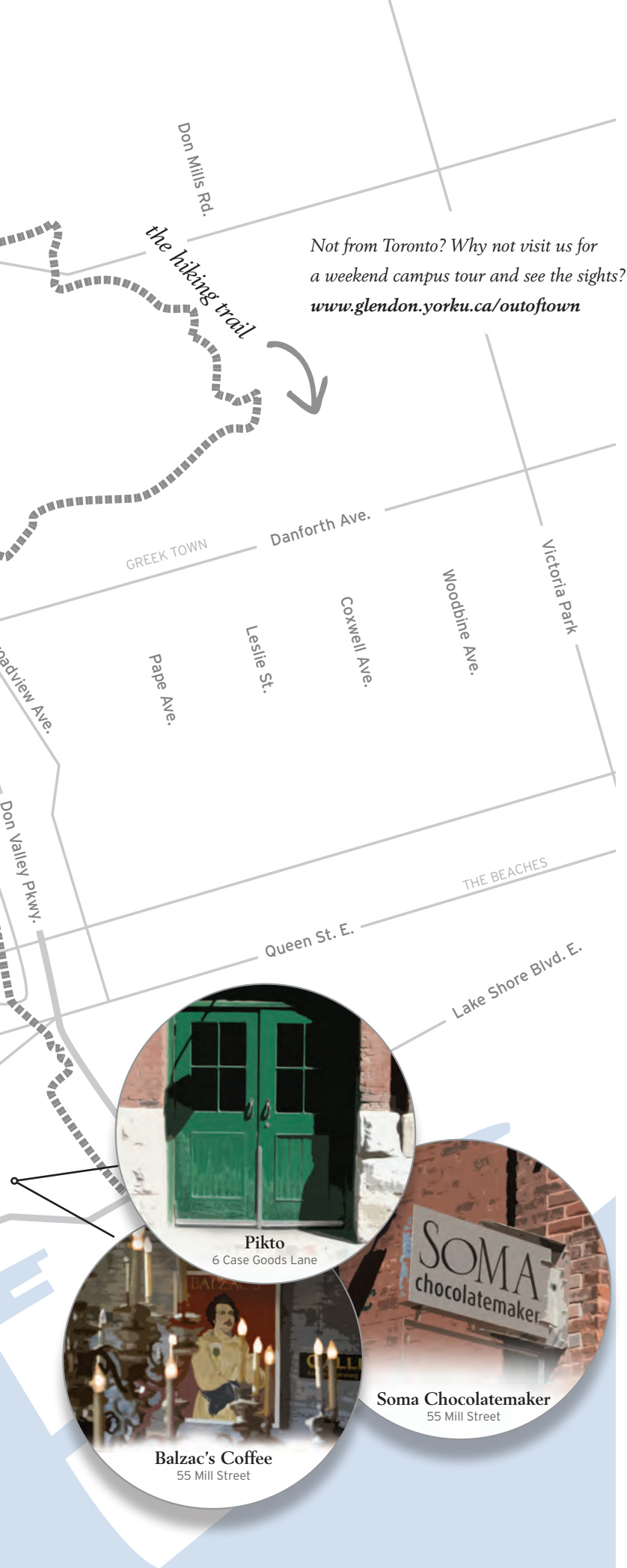

BUILDING YOUR DEGREE

Success at university comes with making good choices—knowing your options and building a degree that matches your interests and goals for the future. Here are some key terms and things to consider when planning your studies.

Choose your degree

Bachelor of Arts (BA)

Glendon's BA is offered in 20 different areas of study, and normally takes about 4 academic years (full-time studies) to complete. Our BA is interdisciplinary, allowing you to build expertise in one or a few areas and get a well-rounded education with a solid foundation in English and French.

International Bachelor of Arts (iBA)

As one of the only iBA programs in Canada, our program includes an international exchange, advanced language training, and internationally-oriented courses. The iBA can be done as a bilingual degree (English and French) or trilingual degree (English, French, and a third language).

Interested in the trilingual iBA? You'll need one year of university study (or the equivalent) first. Apply to the iBA Bilingual, and transfer to the iBA Trilingual later. Previous studies in French recommended for this program. See page 15 or www.glendon.yorku.ca/iba.

Bachelor of Education (BEd)

Our Bachelor of Education (French) can be pursued in combination with a BA or iBA. | See page 28 or www.glendon.yorku.ca/bed.

Choose your program(s)

Major

Choose your major from 20 different programs (e.g. History, English, Psychology, etc). You can select your major heading into first year or begin as an "undecided major" and choose your major by second year. Equally interested in two areas, but don't know what to choose? A double major could be an option that fits your needs. Roughly one-third to one-half of the courses in your degree will be in your major(s).

Minor

A minor is an optional secondary area of study which can be completed alongside your major, and typically represents about one-quarter of the courses in your degree.

Explore your interests

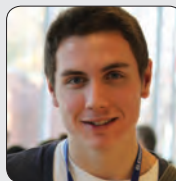
Through electives and general education courses, you'll explore other areas of interest and build variety into your degree.

Certificates

You'll learn about management, international markets, and labour markets, as well as the fundamentals of economic theory. You'll examine questions such as why some countries are rich and others poor, why rent is so much higher in Toronto than in Sudbury, and whether free trade will make us wealthier.

Why Economics at Glendon?

- Our program offers a unique balance between technical analysis and skill-building, and the application of skills to real-world problems. It also allows you the flexibility to shape your degree to match your interests. Focus on contemporary economics, economics and business economic forecasts, or pursue a mathematical and statistical concentration.
- Courses like *Game Theory and Economics* include real-world managerial projects, giving you the knowledge and practical skills you will need to be competitive in the workforce.
- Our professors bring strong international backgrounds and real-world experience. 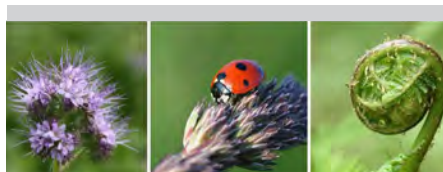

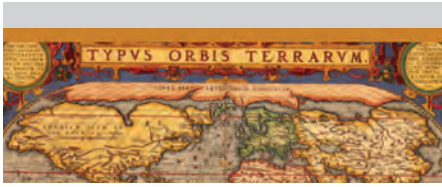

Ian Gentles' research interests include war, military, and security. Latin American specialist Gillian McGillivray was awarded SSHRC (Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council) funds for her research project on sugar and power in the Brazilian countryside.

Linguistics and Language Studies examines the building blocks of languages, how they develop and change over time, how people learn languages, how regional accents differ, and other fascinating language-based questions. Linguistics principles can be applied to all languages; at Glendon, we focus on English, French, and Spanish. Why Linguistics and Language Studies at Glendon?

- Our program offers a rich menu of linguistics branches, including phonetics (the sound properties of language), morphology (word patterns), semantics (the study of meaning in general), historical linguistics (the evolution of languages over time), and sociolinguistics (the relationships between language and social contexts).
- Thanks to our bilingual campus and the growing presence of Spanish, you can apply your learning to three languages in an authentic context. In the classroom, we take a broad view of language learning across the world.
- Our professors are leaders in diverse areas of linguistics research. For example, Dorin Uritescu recently gathered linguistic data on North-Western Romanian dialects to develop an online linguistic atlas that will make the data available for interactive digital analysis. Christine Besnard is a front-runner in research concerning bilingualism among autistic children. William Greaves and James

Benson recently published *Functional Dimensions of Ape-Human Discourse*, which explores language in context, drawing on a multi-leveled, multi-functional linguistics.

- You can benefit from the extensive language resources available outside the classroom. The Glendon Centre for Research on Language Contact provides research assistantships and other opportunities for hands-on experience, and the Linguistics department frequently hosts talks and conferences featuring well-known scholars in the field.
- Our new course *Case Studies in Canada's Aboriginal Languages* includes work with the Ojibwa community of Toronto, as well as a weekend wilderness adventure using the Ojibwa language.
- Interested in studying a third language? There are almost 20 language options across the Glendon and Keele Campuses.

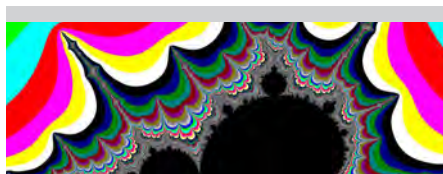

Mathematics is a fundamental basis for a large number of activities in the modern world and is a gateway to numerous professions in teaching, banking, finance, insurance, and actuarial science, just to name a few. The Mathematics program will give you knowledge in various branches of pure and applied mathematics which include, linear and modern algebra, mathematical analysis, topology and geometry, probability and statistics, and the mathematics of investment and of actuarial science.

Why Mathematics at Glendon?

- Small classes will ensure you receive personalized attention from dedicated, approachable, and qualified professors through the various stages of your learning.
- Study with high-profile professors working in a variety of mainstream branches of modern mathematics. Jean-Claude Bouh  nic specializes in probability and statistics. Mario Roy pursues research in analysis (more precisely, in the field of dynamical systems and ergodic theory, with an emphasis on thermodynamic formalism). Alexander Nenashev's research focuses on topics in modern algebra, including algebraic K-theory, Witt theory, and algebraic geometry. David Spring's interests are in the areas of differential geometry and topology and the history of these disciplines.
- Studying mathematics in our liberal arts context gives you the flexibility to explore other academic areas of interest. Combine your mathematics studies with economics, business economics, linguistics, psychology, or another discipline of your choice for a

well-rounded education that will open doors to a wide range of professions.

It's often said that philosophy teaches you not what to think, but *how* to think. Philosophy will help you sharpen your ability to analyze, to question accepted beliefs, and to express ideas clearly. You'll study questions such as: What is truth? How do we come to know the truth? What is it to be a person? Why do we punish criminals by putting them in prison? Is democracy the best system of government?

Through discussing these questions in small class settings, you'll develop a better understanding of different points of view, and will become a better thinker, debater, and writer. The critical thinking skills acquired in studying Philosophy are highly transferable to other disciplines: philosophy majors as a group consistently outperform

Judith Baker gave a talk in Mexico at the National Autonomous University of Mexico (Mexico City) on "trust and commitment" defending the rationality of trusting others. Her areas of expertise are ethics and accountability and also social and political thought. Georges Moyal's study examined the effects of Cartesian metaphysics on common sense and practical wisdom.
- Our "Philosophy at the Movies" series is the only one of its kind, using current movies to explore philosophical issues. Past film screenings included *The Sweet Hereafter* and *The Cider House Rules*.

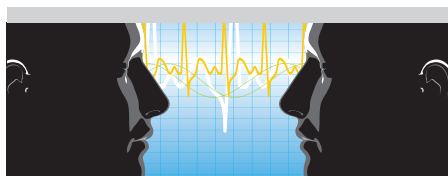

Why Psychology at Glendon?

- Our professors are actively involved in almost all areas of psychology, providing our students with the opportunity to explore a wide variety of topics.
- Tim Moore, who, at a recent Criminal Lawyers' Association meeting, identified several problems with the justice system that can result in false confessions and thereby put innocent people at risk of being convicted of crimes they did not commit; Jim Alcock, whose primary interests include the psychology of faith and superstition; Josée Rivest, a specialist in the area of perception, who often invites students to participate in her research studies; Gerald Young, editor of the journal *Psychological Injury and Law*; Richard Lalonde, whose research interests include prejudice, cultural differences, and identity in Canada; and Guy Proulx, an expert on aging, its

effects, and possible treatments.

- You can gain hands-on experience in our on-campus perception psychology laboratory, or through our partnership with the Baycrest Centre for Geriatric Care, which offers internships and part-time employment opportunities to our students.
- Each year, the department hosts special events, including Primates Day and Research Day, where students and professors showcase their projects in fairs and presentations.
- Students are able to get to know and interact with professors directly and informally thanks to our small class sizes.

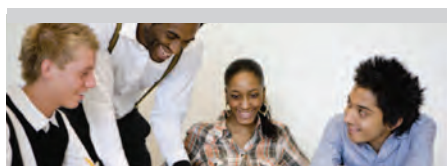

You'll study the principles of linguistics and language learning and participate in an exciting micro-teaching practicum in Cuba. The program's founder, Professor Ian Martin, is renowned for his work on language acquisition. Graduates of the DTEIL are often selected for ESL teaching opportunities abroad, including the JET program in Japan.

Student Access Guarantee

The Student Access Guarantee is a partnership between the University and the Government of Ontario that ensures students who receive financial aid from the Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP) and are identified as having financial need have their direct educational costs covered (tuition, books, and mandatory course fees). However, in some situations, a student's financial need may be above what OSAP can provide; this is when the Student Access Guarantee can help.

For high school applicants, scholarships are calculated based on your final grade 12 average, so work hard right until the end of the year to maximize your scholarship offer.

2. Fill out your Student Financial Profile

The Student Financial Profile (SFP) is an online application used to apply for hundreds of scholarships, awards, and bursaries. It's available in December through your MyFile account, using the reference number you receive when you apply. Fill it out as soon as you can—even if you haven't received an offer yet—so that we can let you know what funding is available to you.

1. Application

Apply through the Ontario Universities' Application Centre at ouac.on.ca for January, May, and September entry.

2. Official transcripts are required to be sent directly from all institutions you've attended (secondary and postsecondary), even if you studied part time or several years ago. Transcripts, certificates, and other formal academic credentials not in English or French must also be translated by a certified translator and included with the original document.

U.S. applicants: We may offer conditional admission with strong Grade 11 finals. To be considered for early conditional admission, you must send us a transcript showing registration in Grade 12 courses.

3. Submit mid-term results or predicted grades and proof of enrolment in senior year as soon as they become available.
